- 1) Breaching a court order means **disobeying** the court order.
- 2) The **Maintenance Enforcement Program** enforces child and spousal support orders and agreements.
- 3) Reciprocating jurisdictions for the Maintenance Enforcement Program include all of the **provinces** and **territories** in Canada.
- 4) If one of the parents is taking the child from Manitoba without permission, the **police** should be called immediately.
- 5) If one parent detains or conceals a child under 14 from the other parent, that parent may be charged with **abduction** under the *Criminal Code*.
- 6) *The Hague Convention on the Civil Aspects of International Child Abduction* is a **treaty** that Manitoba has implemented. It applies where a child has been **abducted** by a parent and taken to another country that also has implemented the treaty.
- 7) The Maintenance Enforcement Program can collect both periodic payments and **lump sum** payments.
- 8) To enforce support orders the Maintenance Enforcement Program can garnish wages, garnish bank accounts, seize property, suspend **driver's licences**, suspend or deny **passports**.
- 9) If a parent is not following custody, access or care and control arrangements, one of the options the other parent has is resolving the matter out of court through **negotiation** or **mediation**.
- 10) *The Child Custody Enforcement Act* includes provisions to assist with enforcing a custody/access order.
